Course Descriptions:

General Education Courses:

Principles of Christian Living: This basic course in moral guidance treats the principles of Christian morality and their application to the nurses' personal and professional life.

Principles of Christian Marriage: This is a special course in marriage guidance for senior students. The aim is to interpret the responsibilities inherent in Christian marriage.

Ethics: A course designed to help the nurse understand the natural and [?] laws, and the tru standards of morality. It emphasizes the application of ethical principles to the solution of professional and personal problems.

Biological and Physical Sciences:

Anatomy and Physiology: This course proposes to help the student acquire an understanding of fundamental concepts of body structure and function so that she [may?] apply this knowledge pf anatomical and physiological principles in [?] own personal hygiene and in the nursing care of patients.

Chemistry: A study of organic and biological chemistry with a review of inorganic chemistry as related to nursing. Knowledge acquired in this course [?] its application to help more meaningful the applied sciences [?] arts.

Microbiology: This course is designed to develop an understanding and appreciation of the characteristics and activities of micro organisms, their relations to health, diseases and the scientific development in the field [?] microbiology. Emphasis is placed on basic principles and procedures [involved?] in preventing diseases, in achieving sterilization, asepsis, [iso... ?] and in their application to health care.

Nutrition: A study of the fundamental principles of nutrition including the [?] of food for well balanced meals in normal and therapeutic [?]. The course includes consideration of modifications in the normal [?] in the treatment and control of disease.

Non-Clinical Courses:

Trends in Professional Nursing: A course designed to guide the senior student in learning the means which help in continued professional growth and successful adjustment in Professional Nursing. Emphasis is placed on the knowledge of the social and economic situation, so that the student will understand and appreciate the responsibilities of the graduate professional nurse.

Social Science

Social Sciences in Nursing

Physchology-Sociology: A course designed to equip the student with a better understanding of the behavior problems concerning the child, the adult, and the aged. It strives to help her understand herself. This course also provides the student with a basic knowledge of man as a social being and his adjustment to environment. It is an interpretation of the effect environmental, economic, and family problems have on the health of the individual person and the community.

History of Nursing: This course deals with the development of nursing from the pre-Christian era to the modern period in an attempt to engender an appreciation of the past and clarify the position of nursing in modern world health.

Clinical Courses:

Principles of Nursing: This course aims to help the student to an effective application [of] the scientific principles involved in giving good nursing care to people of all age levels with emphasis on safe practice. It is designed [to] help the student develop an understanding of good body mechanics. The student is assisted in acquiring the mental skills and attitudes essential in the maintenance of satisfactory inter-personal relationships. Maternal and Child Nursing: Maternal nursing is the study of the care of mother and baby from [?] beginning of pregnancy through the puerperal period with consideration of emotional aspects and abnormalities of pregnancy. Child nursing is the study of the normal child from infancy to adolescence with special consideration given to normal growth and development. It includes the study of diseases and abnormalities specific [?] this age group with mental, physical, social and emotional aspects of [?] well defined.

Psychiatric Nursing: This course in the fundamentals of modern psychiatric nursing is [?] at Our Lady of Peace Psychiatric Hospital School of Nursing, Louisville, Kentucky. The aim is to help the student to understand the [?] of behavior and personality integration; to help the student [?] the problems of all types of patients; to become aware of the [?] aspects by understanding the mechanisms of wholesome personality development.

Medical and Surgical Nursing I: This course incorporates the study of the cause of disease and method of diagnosis. The student learns the symptoms of disease and methods of treatment for medical and surgical pathological conditions. Included are instruction and supervised practice in the care of patients with neoplastic conditions and respiratory diseases with attention to drugs, diets, etc. Factors in prevention and public helath problems are also considered.

Medical and Surgical Nursing II: This course incorporates the study of patients with diseases of the circulatory system, patients suffering from digestion disturbances, metabolic diseases as well as patients suffering from pathological conditions of the female generative system with attention given to drugs, diets, etc., pertaining to these diseases. It includes instruction and supervised practice in aseptic technique.

Medical and Surgical Nursing III: This course incorporates the study and care of patients with urinary diseases, conditions of the eye, ear, nose and throat, as well as the diseases involving bones, muscles and the integumentary system. The importance of early diagnosis as a means of reducing incidence of these diseases is emphasized. Consideration is given to the socio-economic and rehabilitation problems.

Medical and Surgical Nursing IV: This course incorporates the study and care of patients suffering from organic conditions of the nervous system – Emergency, First Aid and Civil Defense is incorporated into this last quarter of Medical Surgical Nursing. This standard first aid course gives practice in bandaging, splinting and in the application of principles of safe and effective first aid care. Included are the basic principles and methods of providing care in emergency situations that might arise in the community.
